Con fecha 11 de noviembre de 2006, el mundo de los trabajadores conoció de una nueva publicación: *Comments* (Comentarios), publicación de la Federación Sindical Mundial (FSM), editada desde su sede central en Atenas, Grecia.

En el primer número se tratan brevemente diversas cuestiones, tales como, la muerte de 150 mil trabajadores hacia el año 2003 debido al asbesto, la esclavitud en Corea del Sur, las ganancias de transnacionales como Pfizer, Lukoil y Exxon Mobil, y la cancelación de la deuda por China a países africanos. En la sección *Alrededor del mundo* se aborda la situación en Oaxaca (México) y en Africa, así como la OTAN y las

drogas, la libertad a los cinco prisioneros cubanos y el desempleo récord en Inglaterra.

Con relación a Oaxaca, la publicación de la FSM dice que “los habitantes de México están viviendo días de dignidad y resistencia. Miles de mexicanos apoyan a los rebeldes de Oaxaca. Con su principal demanda de remoción del gobernador, Ulises Ruiz, y recibiendo violencia y represión como única respuesta, los rebeldes se han declarado fuertes, unidos y resueltos”.

150,000 workers will be dead by end 2030 because of Asbestos
 In a special three day seminar organized in Europe, horrifying information was presented about the overwhelming consequences of asbestos to the health of workers. International research showed that the diseases caused by asbestos kill more people than any other work-related reason. These diseases (asbestos - mesothelioma - lung cancer) do not present symptoms at once and this makes it difficult to calculate the precise number of victims of asbestos. Nevertheless, it is estimated that asbestos is to blame for illnesses that cause 300 deaths per year. Other estimates indicate that by 2030, 150,000 workers will have died from asbestos-related causes! At the same time and while the use of asbestos has been "prohibited" in the countries of the EU, thousands of workers have already been exposed and continue being exposed as asbestos is a preferred material because it's cheap and durable. Campaigns have started all over the world demanding the prohibition of the use of asbestos, that workers be informed about precautionary measures where the use of asbestos is unavoidable, and that the minimum limit of safe exposure to asbestos is

SLAVES! In South Korea.
 South Korea. The majority of workers (self-employed, seasonal workers, part-time workers, etc.) is deprived of labour rights. The situation that these workers face when they try to claim their rights is reminiscent of the Middle Ages. The government punishes trade unions, attacks and represses trade unions and invades union offices using tear gas. Condemnation by the international community of the government of S. Korea and support for the trade unions and workers is increasing day by day. 15 November was the International Day of Action for the trade unions of S. Korea, with trade unions all over the world actively showing their international solidarity. The World Federation of Trade Unions (WFTU) visited the South Korean Embassy in Athens and handed over a resolution of protest. It also sent a message of solidarity to the Korean Confederation of Trade Unions (KCTU).

PFIZER: PROFITS!
 The big multinational drug industries are enjoying a golden era around the world. Their profits derive from the exploitation of the working class. They profit from the exploitation of the deprived and the humble. The profits of "PFIZER" reached US \$ 26.36 billion in the first quarter of 2006. The proceeds of the company, which is the world's largest drug manufacturer, were US \$12.5 billion.

LUKOIL: PROFITS!
 The petroleum sector is the engine room of the Russian economy as well. The profits of the Russian firm "LUKOIL" reached a 65% rise within the second quarter of 2006. 10% of this company is owned by the American firm "Conoco Phillips" and the rest is Russian. The company announced that in the current quarter its net profits increased to US \$2.52 billion, up from the US \$1.41 billion that they were during the same period in 2005.

EXXON MOBIL 10,5 billion dollars profit this and this 3 months!
 EXXON MOBIL has announced that its net profits reached US \$10.5 billion in the first quarter of 2006, while in the first quarter of 2005 its net profits were US \$9.92 billion! This news confirms that the huge interests of the monopolies and the multinationals lie behind the war on Iraq.

CHINA CANCELS DEBTS OF US \$1.3 BILLION
 Trade transactions between China and Africa have quadrupled over the last decade and in 2005 reached a volume of \$40 billion. At the end of October this year, the third Sino-African co-operation forum was held in Beijing with the participation of 49 countries from Africa. This was an event of great financial and political significance. Within the framework of this forum the People's Republic of China announced that it had cancelled debts of US \$1.3 billion owed by developing countries and that it had also abolished import duties and taxes on 100 products from African countries.
